2.5.1 - Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode. W description within 200 words.

Evaluation Process:

The evaluation of answer scripts can be done by the respective faculty member the scheme of evaluation prepared by the question paper setter. The evaluated scripts will be scrutinized by senior faculty of the department and posted makes the verified for discrepancies.

The evaluated answer scripts will be given to the students to verify and any discrepancies found will be corrected before submitting the final marks to th cell.

B. Process to ensure questions from outcomes/learning levels perspective (5):

The faculty has to plan in advance keeping in view of meeting the course outowhile preparing the questions for subjective tests.

In order to cover all the course outcomes, different questions are to be prepusing Bloom's taxonomy, along with the scheme.

To reflect the different learning capabilities and skills of students, the quare prepared based on course outcomes mapping with Bloom's score.

These are the questions that the students "must know" -These questions constituted fundamental concepts of a subject and it is mandatory that every student know concepts. Further, these questions are at the lower level of Blooms taxonomy Remembering and Understanding. Lack of these fundamental concepts would mean student is not fit for passing this course.

A transparent, time-bound and efficient method is being followed in SIRCRRCOI terms of dealing with internal examination related grievances. Various internexaminations are being performed throughout the semester. Some of them are intest 1, Internal Test 2, assignments, lab continuous evaluation, project evaletc.

Internal Assessments (Test 1 and Test 2):

The internal test is conducted strictly according to schedule given by JNTUK faculty evaluates the papers within a week of conduction of test. The evaluat answer sheets are shown to students in class and faculty undertakes individual grievances with a student on the paper if required by the student. At the end semester the average marks of both the unit-tests is calculated and verified students. If any discrepancies are reported by the students, then they are reby the faculty immediately.

Assignments and Online Quiz:

Faculty evaluates assignments based on the rubric which is also shared with t students. The rubric consists of criteria- timely submission, clarity, neather JNTUK also conducts an online quiz on the same day of examination as that of internal. Internal tests, assignments and online quiz together constitute internals.

Lab experiments:

The experiment performed in lab by the student is immediately evaluated by the faculty and the performance marks are assigned based on the lab rubric design the faculty. The lab rubric is given in the lab manual which is shared with the students well in advance before the lab is conducted.
